Safety Nets

The Safety Nets Stage 2 application has now been submitted.

Following feedback from our grant application we have run multiple patient involvement sessions with over 100 young people to make adjustments to our recent submission. Thank you to all of those who took part in our focus groups. Your contributions were incredible and we can't to see you all again soon.

RISH survey:

The questionnaire into restricted intake is now going to be completely redesigned and will start with a questionnaire directed towards clinicians to generate some of the answers needed before moving to a more open questionnaire or interview which has less closed-choice questions and allows the person to tell their story.

VOICES:
